# 我是真葡萄树 —— 约翰福音 15:1-11 I am the True Vine — John 15:1-11

## Scripture Reading: John 15:1-11, Isaiah 11:1-10

John 15:1-11 (NASB1995)

"I am the true vine, and My Father is the vinedresser. 2 Every branch in Me that does not bear fruit, He takes away; and every branch that bears fruit, He prunes it so that it may bear more fruit. 3 You are already clean because of the word which I have spoken to you. 4 Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself unless it abides in the vine, so neither can you unless you abide in Me. 5 I am the vine, you are the branches; he who abides in Me and I in him, he bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing. 6 If anyone does not abide in Me, he is thrown away as a branch and dries up; and they gather them, and cast them into the fire and they are burned. 7 If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. 8 My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit, and so prove to be My disciples. 9 Just as the Father has loved Me, I have also loved you; abide in My love. 10 If you keep My commandments, you will abide in My love; just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His love. 11 These things I have spoken to you so that My joy may be in you, and that your joy may be made full.

## **Background: Upper Room Discourse**

- 1. This is Jesus' final words before crucifixion; this is the warmest room in the world.
- 2. Jesus has by now left the room, heading toward Gethsemane. "Get up, let us go from here." (John 14:31)

## Verses 1-2: Two Types of Branches

- 1. "I am the true vine, you are the branches"? Nope. Please read carefully to see what Jesus emphasizes in this verse.
  - a. This is, in the first place, a story between Jesus and His Father.
- 2. Two types of branches, two ways to cut them.
  - a. Cutting off: fake Christians will be judged by the Father.
  - b. Pruning: true Christians will be sanctified by God's Word.

### Verse 3: Already clean

- 1. Jesus' word (the gospel) is the initial pruning which cleanses us through the forgiveness of sin and joins us to the body of Christ.
- 2. His word is also the purpose of all God's continual pruning work in our lives, so that His word may bear more fruit through us.

### Verses 4-5: Abide in me

1. It's a command: Jesus commands us to strive diligently to remain in Him.

- a. The reason we must strive diligently is because there is resistance. This point seems to have stretched beyond the metaphor of natural branches.
- b. The things we must strive diligently to do is to draw near to God and to obey Him.
- c. Spend time and energy to focus on God, and He will certainly draw near to you. (James 4:8 Draw near to God and He will draw near to you.)
- 2. I abide in you: but in verse 7 it says, "My words abide in you".
  - a. Jesus is so identified with His Word that the abiding of His Word in our life is the way we have Him abide in us.
- 3. It's also a warning: failing to abide in Him results in fruitlessness.
  - a. Can true Christians who have been saved also experience such a tragic condition? Yes. Because these words are said to the "**you**" in verse 3.
  - b. It is precisely to such weak and fruitless Christians that Jesus is exhorting over and over again.

Jesus is being quite realistic here, talking to real Christians.

#### Verse 6: Burned branches

This is a warning to fake Christians. If non-abiding and fruitlessness is the pattern of your life, this verse should make you tremble.

#### Verses 9-11

- 1. 'I have loved you': He has told us so by His own word.
  - a. Love needs to be expressed and affirmed, and that's why God wrote down His works in the Bible. (application for families in Chinese culture)
  - b. The expression of love ensures that all Jesus' words originate from His love and are for the benefit of the branches.
- 2. 'Just as the Father has loved me': the only thing that can measure Jesus' love for us is the Father's love for Him.
- 3. 'My joy': exclusive joy for the new creation: rejoice in what Jesus rejoices in.

### Back to verse 1: I'm the true Vine

- 1. The Old Testament often uses vine or vineyard to represent the Israelites who are expected to bear good fruit before God (Isaiah 5:1-7; Psalm 80:8). However, the Israelites failed to faithfully bear fruit and hence were judged by God.
- 2. Jesus is the true Vine.
  - a. Those who are in Him will never die and will never be forsaken by the Father, for the curse and abandonment have already been borne by Him.
